Academy Heritage

Someone suggested that we include an article on heritage. Some AFA stories and characters like Waldo Dumbsquat are known by everyone. Some characters or legends, you may have heard of in passing, but not known the whole story. For those that haven't heard our own Rick Knoll tell the story, here is the story of Nino Baldachi, sometimes spelled Baldacci, or Balducci (as a first generation immigrant, Nino's name was often misspelled!) as recounted by Class of '61 historian, Hector Negroni. This article was written years ago, so current references are not accurate.

"Here is my recollection of Nino Baldachi. The legendary cadet. Many of the graduates of USAFA remember Baldachi as a mythical cadet. I was one of those doubting Thomases until I read in the 1975 issue of the Air Force magazine a letter from 1st Lt Nino Baldachi, 57 Fighter Intercept Squadron, Keflavik complaining that his Squadron, "The Black Knights" had been Air Defense Commands finest since June 1973. There it was, Nino was a pilot. I knew he would go far! And there he was...in Iceland. But let us go back in time. Nino entered the aerospace panorama with the arrival of the first cadets at the AFA in 1955. When I arrived at USAFA in 1957 (as a member of the third graduating class) Nino was everywhere, but was very hard to locate. The closest I came to seeing Nino at the Academy was when he was listed as a member of my Thermodynamics

class in the Spring of 1960. Our instructor for that very difficult class was Maj Donald Lopez (who today is a deputy director of the Air and Space Museum). We were shocked when Don Lopez presented us a paper written by Nino in which Nino explained the intricacies of the esoteric principles of “entropy” and “enthalpy” (if you don’t know what they are look them up in a dictionary...I still don’t know what they are and I fault Don Lopez for that!) Nino became an instant class hero but his stay with our class was short lived. As a result of his many brushes with the military department, due to his proclivity to accrue demerits, Nino washed back to the class of 1962 (the infamous Red Tags).



After his letter to the editor, I tried to track him down but my efforts were fruitless. My letters went unanswered and every time I called his squadron he was either DNIF (with Bronchitis) or else flying over the frigid waters around Iceland. From his Squadron mates in Iceland I learned that Nino was an outstanding pilot who was always scheduled for the toughest missions and in his quiet competent and unassuming manner, completed them flawlessly. I am sure someone out there can add to the Nino Baldachi story.”

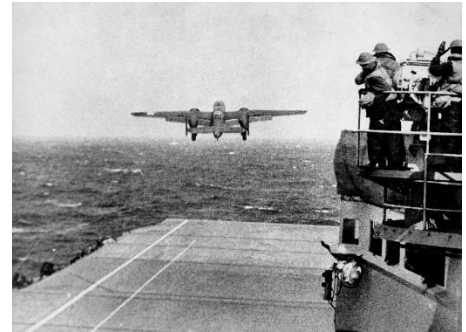

18 April-Quarterly Speaker Series

Join us for a lecture from Jim Johns on the Doolittle Raid. For those that don't know Jim, he has an amazing background in aviation and military history. He was our speaker at our last event as well. Terry Flowers submitted the following on Jim;



The Twin Cities USAFA AOG announces our April speaker is James Johns, Capt USA Retired. Capt Johns is an avid aviator who worked for the FAA as an air traffic controller. In his personal life he owned, restored, and flew many different airplanes, mostly those of WWII vintage. Jim Johns grew up in Minnesota where he still resides. He spent a number of careers in the military with the Marines and the Army, with the FAA as an air traffic controller, as a concert pianist and as an aviator. He and his partner started in 1965 rebuilding mostly WWII aircraft. Their first purchase was five skeleton rebuildable BT-13 airplanes, a ferriable B-25 for \$2500 and two T-6 rebuilders. In 1978 he purchased a Japanese "Kate" torpedo bomber from 20th Century Fox. Jim was "shot down" in "Tora Tora" and "Midway" and other movie reenactments. More recently he

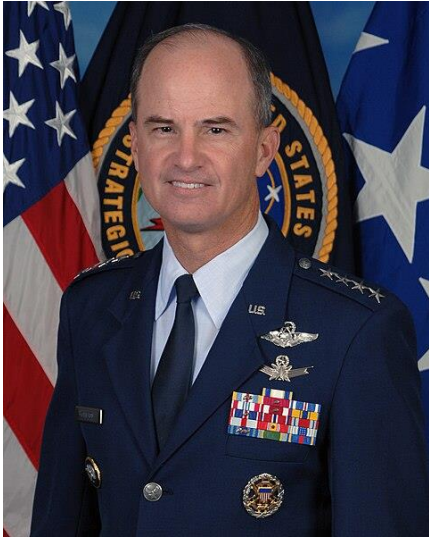


completed the reconstruction of a WWII CG-4 troop carrier glider. I got to personally walk through it during that rebuilding. Over-all he supervised the rebuilding of twenty one WWII airplanes. One TBM is in the Marine Corps Museum at Quantico, a BT-13 is in the WASP museum at Sweetwater, TX, that B-25 is currently flying with the Commemorative Air Force at Fleming Field in So. St. Paul, MN and the CG-4 Glider is at Fagen Fighters Museum in Granite Falls, MN. It was on the air show circuit with that B-25 that he met many of the Doolittle Raiders. He was a personal friend with many and he will tell us the facts about the Minnesota connection to the raid, the altering of the airplanes here in MSP before sixteen B-25s took off on that mission we'll never forget. January Scotch Tasting



On 27 January the TCA USAFA AOG held its annual Scotch Whisky Tasting and celebration of Robert Burns' birthday. We started tasting Scotch whiskies on (or near) Robert Burns' birthday since he is well known as Scotland's most famous bard. He is known for his way with words, clever understanding of human nature and appreciation of women and whisky.

We (USAFA grads, some spouses, and grads from Both West Point and Annapolis) gathered at the home of Terry ('64) and Margaret Flower down in Hastings, with seventeen revelers meeting to taste the subtle nuances of fine single malt Scotch whiskies paired with food items prepared by Margaret. Her culinary delights included traditional foods from the Scottish countryside like cock-a-leekie soup, various shortbreads and of course, that infamous Haggis. Having purchased a lamb, Margaret had available the necessary portions to prepare the Haggis. Terry and Margaret together, stuffed the sausage casings to make it as genuine a dish as could be had.

The color, the vapors rushing into our nasal cavities, the warmth and the hints of the oaken casks, the fruitiness, all of these combined in ways to tease our palates.

Curt Brown led the Toast to the Lassies and Margaret read the Response or Toast to the Ladds. We ended the gathering singing Auld lang Syne (by Robert Burns of course) and vowed to come back next year if not sooner for a Bourbon Tasting.--
